A huge thank you to the parents and staff who helped our teams on their journey to the EZ Football Tournament. It wouldn't be possible without your support.




How do Three-way conferences work?

- The teacher facilitates the conference and guides the child/parent through the process.
- Parents and the teacher are encouraged to ask questions, provide feedback and encouragement to the child and to share their thoughts and ideas on what is being presented and on what goals or targets they think are appropriate.
- Provide a forum for teacher, child and parents to acknowledge the child's progress and achievement.
- Research tells us that they are a valuable avenue for involving parents and children in the learning process.

Currently our teachers are working with their classes to prepare the children for our Three-way Conferences in week 10 and their prompt sheets.

SENIOR MUSEUM FIELD TRIP

Auckland War Memorial Museum

The Kakahi team went to the museum where we saw a great variety of things. We went on this trip so we could learn more about ANZACs that fought in WW1 and our inquiry topic, conflict. WW1 was a good example of world conflict.

We looked at the timeline and important events of WW1, with the help of our amazing tour guide Aaron. Aaron took us around the war exhibition on the third

floor of the museum, discussing the different areas and what it related to. At the end of the tour he let us touch some real artifacts from WW1 itself. It was amazing to feel how heavy the helmets were, hold a real grenade, look at the different documents they needed, and have a turn on a stretcher.

Before or after the tour the classes got to explore the museum exhibitions, where we looked at Pacifika and Maori history, went

inside the marae, and saw the beautiful waka in the middle of the museum. We also had fun exploring the weird and wonderful. After we looked at the important history of New Zealand we went to everyone's favourite place... the volcano room!

MANDARIN IN MAY

This term, we embarked on an exciting journey into Chinese culture again. We delved into different Chinese fascinating traditions and learnt how to say dates, birthdays and family members in Mandarin.

For Year 5-8 students, most have mastered these essential expressions with a simple guide. From the days of the week to the months of the year, we learnt the pronunciation and usage of these Mandarin phrases. In Mandarin, the order of date is totally opposite to English. In Mandarin, the year goes first, followed by the month, and finally the day. Additionally, we shared various ways to celebrate birthdays in different countries. In China, a longevity noodle is one kind of traditional food for birthdays.

For Year 0-4 students, we talked about family. Chinese kinship titles are very different than what is used in the English language for example, in Chinese we distinguish between elder brother (which is gē ge) and younger brother (which is dì di).

China has an ancient culture, so this term, I also arranged some cultural activities. The first one for our senior students is paper-cutting, an ancient Chinese craft that allows you to create intricate and beautiful designs using just paper and a pair of scissors. For our juniors, they learnt something about the panda-national treasure animal of China and made a panda mask.
